Bobbie N. Arnold has been elected to The Legacy Center for Student Success board of directors. The appointment was announced by Richard Dolinski, president of The Legacy Center.

Arnold is president and chief executive officer of The Charles J. Strosacker Foundation. She was raised in Midland and attended Midland Public Schools, Delta College and Bellvue College in Seattle.

Arnold also serves on numerous community and civic boards, including the Development Committee, Mid-Michigan Medical Center--Midland, the Midland Entranceways Initiative Task Force and the Midland Beautification Committee. She is a member of the board of directors of Wolverine Bank and of Zonta International and currently serves on its Public Relations Committee. She also volunteers at Pinecrest Farms.
